

LOGO FORMATION





Top Trends Driving Digital Marketing Strategies By Dr. Ruchi Gupta





E- Filing of ITR1 Workshop





HOW TO PUBLISH RESEARCH PAPERS IN SCOPUS/ INDEXED JOURNALS?




ADMISSIONS AND DEPARTMENTAL ORIENTATION



After lots of deliberation, University of Delhi had to decide about the admission process and its timings keeping in mind the prevailing conditions when various board results of class 12th were also delayed. Giving utmost importance to the safety of employees and students, the University took a bold and unprecedented step. The entire registration and admission process was made online. It began on 10th October, 2020 with the release of the first cutoff list for all the undergraduate courses. The process continued for more than a month in which around 11 cutoffs were released to admit students from all over India to various colleges and courses of the University. The candidates were required to first sign up to the DU website and then register themselves for admission. Afterwards, they were asked to upload their documents like photograph, mark sheet and signature. Once a cutoff was released, the candidate had to check the list and find out the colleges for which he/she was eligible for admission and then apply for the college and course of his/her preference, after due approval from the Principal of that college, he/she was asked to pay the fee using any online mode of transaction like Net banking, cards or UPI so as to get his/her seat confirmed. In the month

of November, the students were sent SMS and e – mails so as to join them to the official WhatsApp group for their online classes.

Around 100 students alone were admitted to the B. Com (Hons.) in Acharya Narendra Dev College. There was an orientation program of college on 18th November, 2020 followed by a departmental orientation on 19th November, 2020. The students were familiarized with the building and classrooms, labs, library of the college via a virtual tour prepared by second year student Ankit Kumar. The department teacher in charge, Dr. Shalu Mahajan gave an overview about the department, faculty members, student societies - Bodhini and Vanijya. She briefed the fresher's about the course structure, exam pattern and academic calendar of the first year. Ms Sangeeta Relan, a senior faculty from the department talked about the achievement of the Alumni and read their messages for the first year students. Time table was provided to the students and the online classes commenced successfully the very next day, i.e., on 20th November, thus making a statement that nothing could dampen or stop us amidst Covid - 19.

Open Book Examinations

For conducting its semester exams, Delhi University came up with an idea of conducting Open Book Examination (OBE) in December 2020 for the semester of July-December 2020. Delhi University conducted these OBE exams earlier also for the students who were in their final year of graduation. OBE exams are as phenomenal as the name sounds for students but as the conditions were better in December the choice between offline exams or OBE online exams was given to the students but majority went towards OBE exams only as the exam was candidate friendly. The student had to write the answers, scan them and send the PDF online within the stipulated time. The basic process was that the question paper used to get uploaded on a student's account on the day of exam. They just had to download the question paper and start writing on sheets. They were allowed to logout their account after downloading the question paper to save their Internet.

The flip side of OBE exams was that the students who were regular in attending their online classes and studied hard could not reap the benefits in the way they deserved. OBE exams were more of a test of your connections than your knowledge. Students lost focus in studies. Usually the time given for all the exams was 4 hours instead of 3 hours of offline as it takes extra time to make pdf and upload them on the portal. Students with any kind of disabilities were given 5 hours. Still it took some more time by some students to upload it if they faced any Internet

Connectivity problems. The exams for first year students for Semester 1 are set to be taken online only in March, 2021 but definitely again the choice between offline and online had been given to the students. As for the semester exams to be held in May for second and third year students it is unpredictable right now to say in which mode they will be conducted.

New Education Policy

What's Education? Is it just related to books or something more like practical life experiences? It is surely the latter. Education is not restricted to books and to gain knowledge just in particular fields, it is about enhancing your experiences and skills for facing the realities of the world. And keeping this in mind the Government of India introduced the New Education Policy which focuses more on quality education.

Changes are for Schools

The "10 + 2" structure will be replaced with the "5+3+3+4" model. Under this structure children will spend 5 years in the Foundational stage, 3 years in the Preparatory stage, 3 years in the Middle stage, and 4 years in the Secondary stage. This structure is formed in line with the various developmental stages a child goes through in his/her journey of school life. The focus will be more on providing students with more opportunities to pursue in their fields of interest while keeping other subjects from other streams as well. Vocational education will be provided to the students for more practical experience.

Board exams will continue to be held for classes 10 and 12 but will be re-designed. To reduce the role of board examinations the paper would be conducted twice a year.

Coding will be introduced from class 6 and experiential learning will be adopted.

The policy raises the importance of mother tongue and regional languages as a medium of instruction for better understanding of the concept until class 5. Sanskrit and foreign languages will also be given emphasis. The policy also states that no language will be imposed on the students.

For Higher Education-

- It proposes a 4-year multi-disciplinary bachelor's degree in an undergraduate programme with multiple exit options. After 4 years of graduation, the post-graduation courses like MA, MSc will be of 1 year.
- The policy proposes to internationalize education in India. Foreign universities can now set up campuses in India. This will give students more exposure to the western education.
- The policy proposes that higher education institutes like the IITs make changes with regard to the diversity of learning for better experience.

The NEP 2020 puts forward many policy changes when it comes to teachers and teacher education. To become a teacher, a 4-year Bachelor of Education will be needed by 2030. The teacher recruitment process will also be strengthened and made transparent. NEP aims to achieve a more knowledgeable and informed society by providing high quality education.

US Elections

In the US, there are only two main parties considered by most voters - The Democrats and the Republicans. Majority of the voters only wait for the candidates from either of these two.

Last year's United States presidential election was the 59th presidential election (being done every four years), held on Tuesday, November 3, 2020.

Former Vice President Joe Biden and incumbent U.S. senator from California Kamala Harris of the democratic party defeated Incumbent president Donald Trump and vice president Mike Pence of the Republican party.

The total vote share won by Joe Biden was 51.3% which was the largest percentage of the popular vote won by any challenger since 1932.

Before, during, and after Election Day, Donald Trump and numerous Republicans attempted to subvert the election and overturn the results, by alleging widespread voter fraud and trying to influence the vote counting process in some major states. William Barr, the Attorney General and officials of the 50 states found no evidence of such fraud or irregularities in the election.

The newly elected President 'Joe Biden' and vice president 'Kamala Harris' of the United States begin their term on 20, January 2021, and by tradition, took the oath of office during an inauguration on the day as per tradition.

The Change in WhatsApp Policy

After Apple's revealing of its major privacy upgrades for its iOS14, a big clash broke out between the tech giant Apple and Facebook. The Facebook Company claimed that the user data was proposed to serve relevant ads and that Apple's policies would affect small business. This is where all the process started. With the world grappling with Facebook's privacy changes that require users to share their WhatsApp data with the parent company Facebook, Apple's privacy labels update all but confirms what we always knew: that data collected by WhatsApp and Facebook Messenger is far more than what its competitors do. The news that WhatsApp will be sharing the personal data of WhatsApp users to Facebook spread like a forest fire. According to WhatsApp it's not new, Facebook is a parent Company and every company connected under Facebook shares the data with Facebook. What all WhatsApp shares is in confusion which company is trying to clarify.

WhatsApp breathed that personal messages had always been encrypted end to end and would remain private. It added that its practice of sharing user's data with Facebook was not new and was not going to be expanded.

What all was there in the notification

The new update includes options in which people will have to message a business on WhatsApp and provide further transparency about how they collect and use data.

Millions of business interactions take place every day on WhatsApp and the new privacy policy updates are supposedly to make these easier while also enabling personalized ads on Facebook.

Company's clarification

The deadline for accepting the policy was 8th February which is now extended till 15th May.

WhatsApp stated the whole news as a confusion and extended the date to clarify itself. WhatsApp said it is going to do a lot more to clear up the misinformation around how privacy and security work on the platform and that it will go to people gradually to review the policy at their own pace before a new business option becomes available on May 15.

WhatsApp clarified in its latest blog on Tuesday that its recent policy update will not affect the privacy of messages with family and friends in any way but that it will include changes in messaging a business account on WhatsApp.

Important disclosures

WhatsApp has been sharing user's data with Facebook for many years. Apple's updated app store privacy policy which requires apps to show a privacy nutrition label that will display the data being collected.

WhatsApp company shares phone no, information about phone model, IP address and financial transaction with Facebook. And all this important information is on WhatsApp website.

Many people have substituted WhatsApp with another app but many people are still using it and don't want the change to come.

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
