15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

ANDC intends to better connect itself with the aims of NEP 2020, which includes strengthening the best practices with a multidisciplinary approach. The nine departments of the college work together to create opportunities for the students to study different fields of study. These include the mathematical, physical, biological and chemical sciences as well as the commerce department.

The college offers numerous opportunities for its students to participate in UG research under the supervision of faculty mentors and distinguished scientists in frontier areas of Science and technology. One of the best examples of the college's multidisciplinary approach towards research is the unique research programme for the UG students called ELITE (Education in a Lively

Innovative Training Environment Scholarship). Each ELITE project has a maximum of 10 students who can be from different areas of study. Under this scheme, the students from a particular discipline can seek mentorship of faculty members from a discipline that may be entirely different from the students' field of study at the college. These projects proffer opportunities for publications as well as presentations on national as well as international levels. There will be "multiple exits" and "multiple entries" points during the higher education tenure and credits will be transferred through the ABC seamlessly. Acharya Narendra Dev College, being a constituent college of the University of Delhi, is committed to adhere to the protocols and regulations of Academic Bank of Credits as mandated by the University of Delhi.

The college offers several opportunities to the students for skill development.

Skill Development Workshops conducted during 2020-21

Workshop on "Hybrid Mobile App development using Flutter programming"

A five-day workshop on Hybrid Mobile App development using Flutter programming was organized by the college from July 13-17, 2020 in technical collaboration with industry partner M/s Brain Mentors Pvt. Ltd. under the aegis of ANDC SPIE Student chapter.

In today's time of smart phones, knowledge of Flutter programming which has become one of the most popular programming languages for mobile application development is a must. The workshop was attended by students as well as faculty members of different departments from various colleges. During the five-day workshop, the participants were given a very comprehensive understanding of various aspects of flutter programming including:

- a) Basic Flutter architecture, Flutter and Dart Set-up
- b) Building simple applications on real device and emulator
- c) Flutter Navigators & Routes and event handling

At the end of the workshop, the participants were able to build simple mobile applications and demonstrate their successful implementation on a real device.

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Workshop on "Hands on training for skill development"

UBA@ANDC organised 'Hands on training' for skill development of the interested residents of the adopted area, Govindpuri on March 01 and 02, 2021. During recent visits to the area by UBA volunteers, they discussed the problems faced by the residents to which most of the residents informed that they are struggling for their livelihood as due to corona they do not have any more paid jobs. The purpose of the training programme was to help them be self-reliant. In the training programme, UBA@ANDC along with the Entrepreneurship Cell of the college, trained them in the preparation of different types of Hand Washes (Liquid Soap). During the programme, participants were given motivational talk and were also groomed with marketing skills. The participants were also given the set of material required for the preparation of these liquid soaps.

Workshop on "Advanced Bioinformatics"

Department of Biomedical Science, Botany and Zoology of Acharya Narendra Dev College, University of Delhi under the patronage of Prof. Ravi Toteja (Officiating Principal, ANDC) organized a threeday national workshop on the topic "A Step-by Step Guide to Data Mining from Literature to Database" under the aegis of DBT-STAR College Scheme from 1-3 March 2021 on Google Meet. The resource person for the workshop was Dr. Srinivasan Ramachandran, Senior Principal Scientist, CSIR-Institute of Genomics and Integrative Biology. To ensure maximum interaction between participants and the resource person, the number of participants was limited to 30. The information about the workshop was disseminated on various official social media channels of the college including Instagram, Facebook, Twitter and the college website, wherein the list of interested participants were sought via registration form. On the first day, participants were given theoretical instructions on the significance and techniques involved in performing data mining from literature to pathways. For the subsequent two days, the participants were divided into small groups of 4-5, where each group was guided in a step-bystep manner to work on any one disease case or a technology case. During this workshop, the participants learnt how to extract gene list for different topics from t2doacid.igib.res.in, enrichment analysis functional interactive network, pathways recognition and biological interpretation of data using Gene cards and Uni prot. After the hands-on workshop, each group also presented for about 5-8 minutes on their results with discussion. The session was concluded with a vote of thanks by Dr. Rashmi Sharma. This immensely interactive session bridged the communication gap we often feel during online workshops, and allowed participants to enhance their

applied bioinformatics knowledge. The participants were highly satisfied with their experience and showed willingness to attend many more such workshops in the future.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

The college offers Generic Elective (GE) Courses in Language, Literature and Culture and Readings in Indian Diversities and Literary Movements that intend to familiarize the students with and inculcate in them Indian knowledge systems. These courses include a close reading of texts written in the Indian languages and translated into English, belonging to the temporal and spatial areas of Indian history that hold relevance in terms of ideologies concerning Indian cultural heritage, the legacy of our past and needs of the contemporary society, to adapt, interact and celebrate our diverse and pluralistic culture. The paper on Yoga and Stress Management helps students in understanding ways to harmonise the body and mind through yoga and to navigate life with a holistic approach.

19. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE): Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

ANDC imparts outcome-based education through the Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) and Foreign Language Courses. These courses aim at providing life skills as well as technical and professional skills to students for their holistic education and to increase their employability. The SECs may be chosen from a pool of papers designed to provide value based and skill-based knowledge and contain both theory and lab/hands-on/training/field work.

Learning Outcome of SEC papers

- Medical Diagnostics To teach techniques to diagnose normal and abnormal physiological conditions using various kinds of blood tests, blood glucose and cholesterol tests.
- Apiculture This is a vocational course involving bee keeping and production of honey and wax.
- Sericulture The aim of this paper is to provide knowledge about rearing of silk worms to produce silk, thus, helping students to think of other alternative career options.
- Public health and hygiene This paper intends to give students a basic knowledge of public health and hygiene.
- LaTeX and HTML The intended learning outcome of this paper is to enable students to use software and programming

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- languages like LaTeX and HTML to design and produce technical and scientific documentation and create their own web pages.
- Intellectual Property Rights The paper is aimed at exposing the students to the concept of Intellectual Property, the types of Intellectual Property and Intellectual Property Laws.

Foreign Language Courses

The college offers one-year part time certificate, diploma and advanced diploma courses in French, German, Spanish and Russian which are recognized by the University of Delhi.

20.Distance education/online education:

ANDC adopted modern technologies for online education during the COVID-19 pandemic. The college already boasts of state-of-the-art technology for use in seminar rooms and conferences, including projectors, screens, and audio/video conferencing systems, allowing for seamless online participation in webinars and hybrid meetings. For live demonstration of experiments, the faculty members of the college performed live experiments and recorded/transmited to students staying in remote locations. Many experiments were conducted and demonstrated to students using virtual labs. These measures served the purpose of preparing the college for imparting distance /online education.

The faculty members and students possess individual login credentials to gain access to the library's N-LIST and INFLIBNET electronic resources along with the Delhi University Library System (DULS) library catalogue which allows access to articles and books across the institution.

1.1.1 - The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

Within the confines of the University of Delhi's curricula, ANDC has taken proactive steps to reinvent regular classroom teaching by fortifying it with customised enabling experiences to assist each student in achieving a holistic education, in addition to achieving generic goals such as specific course objectives and learning outcomes. This is being done in order to help each student attain a wholesome education. The usual student-centred teaching and learning experience at ANDC is supplemented with interactive Information and Communication Technology (ICT) tools, in addition to hands-on workshops that buttress syllabus specified practical activities. Students are informed about the various activities of the college via notices that are shared through emails and are also displayed on the college website. The identification of students' learning challenges and specific needs is accomplished through the use of tutorials, continuous internal assessment, and mentor-mentee interactions. In addition to receiving hands-on training on cutting-edge laboratory equipment,

students can now rest certain that they have access to all the necessary course material thanks to careful monitoring and prompt acquisition. Peer support and formal capacity development programmes have helped the faculty remain appropriately motivated, oriented, and professionally enabled despite the constraints imposed by regular syllabus revisions over the past few years. These programmes have been effective in overcoming these constraints.

Acharya Narendra Dev College (ANDC) as a constituent college of the University of Delhi, adheres to the academic calendar and examination schedule announced by the University regarding teaching-learning, examinations, summer and winter vacations, in addition to two mid-semester breaks. This includes the University's policy on the length of time between examinations. The College provides a well-rounded educational experience through the implementation of a student-centric approach. NSS@ANDC provides students with intensive training to help them inculcate human values and get involved in the welfare of the local community through outreach activities.

ANDC's environmental society, Paritantra givesthe opportunity to gain a nuanced grasp of all the environmental concerns. The college offers a compulsory paper, Environmental Studies, which is a part of the curriculum of all undergraduate students. This paper aims to inculcate the importance of environmental concerns and sustainability in the students. The college has a dedicated society for women's empowerment called Sashakt. It encourages sensitization to gender issues and its influence may be felt at all levels. Girl students also receive training from members of the Delhi Police Department to recognise aggressive or unwanted

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male behaviour and to actively repel it. The college has an Internal Complaints Committee (ICC) that handles cases related to sexual harassment of the female students and staff of the college. The Equal Opportunity Cell of the college helps sensitize the students towards Divyang persons. The Theatre Society of the college organizes Nukkad Nataks with the specific aim of creating awareness amongst students with respect to various social issues.

2.2 - Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 - The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organizes special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

ANDC gets students from a wide and varied geographical locations who belong to diverse economic backgrounds. A natural fall out is that many students have problems with the language and hence the grasp of their subjects. Once this issue was recognized, all efforts were made to resolve it. The college has a well thought out mentoring scheme whereby a group of students are placed under the guidance of a mentor from the same department. The respective faculty mentors hold regular interactive sessions with their mentees to solve their queries, guide and counsel them on academic and personal matters and monitor their progress periodically. We believe that education is empowerment and therefore we guide our students towards higher studies, professional courses, and administrative jobs. Most of our students thus aim high and opt for postgraduate studies, MBA, CA and IAS. To bridge the gap between slow and advanced learners, some departments like Commerce, Mathematics, English and Economics conduct tutorial classes for clarifying doubts, explaining concepts by simplifying them, giving practice questions, thereby providing them full support and encouragement.

2.3 - Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 - Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

All the departments of the college regularly conduct webinars and other educational events for making teaching-learning a more fruitful experience. In addition, the college has established a number of research laboratories for Ph.D. students. Another experiment centre in the college is the Th!nk Lab which is run entirely by students. It is a part of the Collaborative Undergraduate Biology Education (CUBE) programme at the Homi Bhabha Centre for Science Education (HBCSE) of the Tata Institute of Fundamental Research (TIFR) in Mumbai. This cutting-edge laboratory contributes to the development of a more integrated understanding of both the scientific fields and the wider world. Students have been inspired to consider research as a potential field of employment because of the DBT-STAR College Scheme, which has provided them with the opportunity to gain hands-on experience using cutting-edge technology. The encouragement of scientific curiosity has also assisted students in launching their own businesses under the campus's ANDC-inStart Foundation, which is a business incubator financed by the Government of NCT of Delhi. The institution offers a number of different field trips as part of its EXPLORE programme. These trips assist students build knowledge, analytical abilities and communication skills while also exposing them to real-life scenarios.

2.3.2 - Teachers use ICT enabled tools for effective teaching-learning process. Write description in maximum of 200 words

Realizing the significance of information and communication technology in the modern world, the classrooms at ANDC have been digitised. This has made it possible for teachers/students to make use of the dynamic, colourful, and graphic tools of power point presentations. The college has digital notice boards to keep the students informed about the latest developments. E-mail serves as the primary mode of communication between students-collegeinstructors. Because of this, teachers are able to administer objective assessments online and provide the students with the necessary study material. Additionally, the college is home to a sizable Web Facilitation Centre where the students have access to computer systems that come equipped with high-speed internet connectivity. This is in addition to five computer labs, which have the capacity to accommodate a total of about 250 students. Using this infrastructure, the Departments of Mathematics, Chemistry, Physics and Electronics are supplementing their regular teaching-learning process using apps including TinkerCad, Mathematica, Matlab, Origin and Gaussian. TinkerCad, a freely downloadable app, allows simulation of hands-on practicals being conducted by Physics and Electronics. In addition, the college has two laboratories specifically dedicated to enhance learning experiences using ICT tools: 3D Printing and Designing Laboratory, and Embedded System and Robotics laboratory.

The RFID enabled library has 33000 odd book titles, allowing nocontact issue and return of books. The option to search books is OPAC (Online Public Access Catalogue) enabled.

2.5 - Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 - Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode. Write description within 200 words.

The college adheres to guidelines, syllabi, and assessment procedures in accordance with the guidelines issued by the University of Delhi. Therefore, there is a component of Internal Assessment (IA) worth 25 percent in the theory paper and 50 percent in the practical component. Every single student is reminded at various points throughout the academic year that they are participating in a process of continuous evaluation, and this is done to ensure that they do not suffer any kind of grade reduction. The Internal Assessment is further broken down into the following categories: a) Test (10 marks), b) Assignment (10 marks) and c) Attendance (5 marks). The evaluation is carried out with enough notice and at regular intervals spread out over the course of the semester. Students are given the opportunity to engage in conversation with their instructors after the grades have been distributed publicly in the classroom. The individual components of the internal assessment are posted on the college notice boards at the end of the semester. The feedback provided by students is analysed, and if there is a problem with it, it is fixed before

being uploaded on the University website.

In addition to the end-of-semester examinations that the university administers on time according to the schedule, the progress of students is monitored through continuous evaluation in the form of assignments, tests, presentations, and other innovative instruments to gauge students' achievements that are specific to the courses they are taking. Students who are not performing up to their potential are offered multiple opportunities to improve. The IA scores are reviewed by the college's Internal Assessment Committee, and then those results are made public and made available to the students. After that, the Internal Assessment Committee is in control of things, and after giving these marks one last look over, they submit them on the University of Delhi website so that they can be included in the summative evaluation. If at any point during the process an error is discovered, the process of redressal is started as quickly as possible through the established procedure.

DU introduced the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) in 2015-2016 in the form of Generic Electives (GE), Discipline Specific Electives (DSE), Ability Enhancement Courses (AECC) and Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC). In 2019, the University adopted the CBCS-LOCF curriculum. ANDC has the intention of establishing its broad-learning outcomes in a manner that is congruent with its legacy, vision, and mission, all of which have an impact on every facet of a college student's life. The structure of the CBCS

allows for a degree of adaptability by providing students with a selection of elective and interdisciplinary courses to choose from. At the micro-level, each individual course presents its own one-of-a-kind set of learning outcomes that are tied to the overall curriculum. Following an efficient method of pedagogical practices, instructors share with students at the beginning of each session the overarching goal of the specific course they are enrolled in, as well as the desired outcomes for each individual topic. The particular goals are covered again in depth through conversations and lessons conducted in small groups. Students are educated about the significance of reaching a conclusion, either in the form of results from an exercise set or an experiment carried out, for the entirety of their time spent in practical classes. The learner receives immediate feedback, and corrective action is taken, in order to guarantee that the student has the greatest possible learning experience.

By encouraging its teachers and laboratory staff to routinely engage in Faculty Development Programmes (FDPs) and Refresher Courses, the institution is able to ensure that its classroom teachinglearning process is kept up to date. In 2020-21, the teachinglearning process was carried out in an online setting when the COVID-19 epidemic was in full swing. ANDC decided to use a more modern mechanism in order to guarantee the smooth operation of the same by implementing digital learning strategies across a variety of different platforms. The most up-to-date digital tools and technology not only ensured regular connection between students and teachers, but also expanded the range of possibilities for learning outcomes. ANDC continued to conduct its regular internal evaluations and assessments using the online format, in addition to adhering to the CBCS structure and the criteria established by the University of Delhi for the administration of open-book exams.

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The tutorials for each class were carried out as usual, and the time allotted to students and the issues they were having was made as flexible as possible for the convenience of the students. In order to address the concerns voiced by the students in a timely manner, appropriate remedial action was taken wherever it was practicable to do so.

NSS@ANDCencourages students to take part in various community service activities and programmes. During the COVID-19 pandemic, NSS volunteers worked round the clock to reach out to university

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staff members and other people in distress and tried to help them in every possible manner like development of Chat Bot system on WhatsApp, providing verified leads about COVID-19 resources. A webinar on 'Cancer VIRANIs' was organized to celebrate the breast cancer month i.e., October 2020. Through the VID-IPSA project, underprivileged children, especially girls living in slums were educated. A stationery distribution drive was also conducted on February 21, 2021 in Okhla village. The NSS wing actively participated in the Delhi government's 'Youth for Education Program' through a series of five interactive webinars. Fifty three student volunteers were selected to act as mentors for class 9-12 students of government schools. On February 21, 2021, NSS volunteers toured the Okhla slums and talked to the residents to make them aware about the need to keep their surroundings clean. Besides, the college is one of the participating institutions in Unnat Bharat Abhiyan (UBA) with Indian Institute of Technology, Delhi as the Regional Coordinating Institute. Under UBA, ANDC has adopted five rural areas in South Delhi; viz., Khanpur, Govindpuri Slum Area, Okhla Industrial Area, Pul Pehlad and Tajpur Pahari Badarpur. Under the purview of UBA, ANDC is working towards sustainable initiatives in these villages.

4.1 - Physical Facilities

4.1.1 - The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching-learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

The campus is enabled with good Wi-Fi connectivity. The college provides its students with access to computers and its faculty members have access to cutting-edge tablets while working online. Every classroom and laboratory has a Wi-Fi connection, a multimedia system, and an LCD projector installed. Students are given the opportunity to work during their leisure time in a designated Web Facilitation Centre (WFC). The staff rooms of the

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departments are equipped with computers and printing equipment. The library also has the capability to provide rapid access to digital knowledge resources through the use of Delhi University Library System (DULS). The college library works on RFID System, where students themselves can get the books issued or returned independently. There are offices of administration, accounts, library, caretaker, laboratories, WFC, examination control room, and other miscellaneous services, all of which have ergonomically designed work spaces with modern and environment friendly equipment. The college's information technology infrastructure consists of cutting-edge hardware that is driven by necessary software and supported by lightning-fast internet connection.

ANDC has both outdoor and indoor sports facilities. The Fitness Centre is equipped with both free weights and cardio training equipment such as cross trainers and bicycles to meet the demands of both students and faculty. In addition, the Fitness Centre offers many chess and carrom sets, chess tables and Olympic size table tennis table. Weight lifting and powerlifting have their own specific facilities, such as benches and stands, which are available for use. The college provides facilities for a wide variety of outdoor sports, including athletics (track and field), cross-country, and a half marathon. Additionally, the college has dedicated courts for badminton (13.4 m x 6.1 m), basketball (28 m x 15 m), volleyball (24 m x 9 m), and a football ground (90 m x 55 m). Yoga sessions, both for casual users and for students whose curricula include yoga as a required component, are held in a section of the field that has been set aside specifically for that purpose. Aerobic workouts are also performed in the same location.

4.3 - IT Infrastructure

The IT facilities in the college were put to extensive use during the COVID-19 pandemic to host Virtual Laboratories by the departments. The entire campus is equipped with Wi-Fi, and there is enough bandwidth to support all the devices used by all the students, faculty, and staff members, enabling them to connect to the internet in a streamlined manner. The Web Facilitation Centre (WFC) of the college has a backbone of two servers, both of which are enabled with RAID (Redundant Array of Independent Disks) technology. On June 05, 2020, the college library switched to the ILMS offered by open-source software, KOHA On Cloud. Mostdepartmentsare supplementing their regular teaching-learning process using apps including TinkerCad, Mathematica, Matlab, Origin and Gaussian. The college staff was provided access to customized Google accounts (andc domain), by the University of Delhi, which allow unlimited storage capacity on the drive. In order to facilitate the conduct of online classes during the COVID-19 pandemic, the University of Delhi also provided the faculty and the students with Microsoft Teams accounts. The students and the faculty made good use of these facilities for the smooth conduct of classes. ANDC has access to QuillBot, a paraphrasing tool which helps prevent plagiarism and Ouriginal by Turnitin, a plagiarism checking software. Together, these tools help us maintain international standards in our scientific communications. The campus is under CCTV surveillance that ensures the safety of our students. The college also has digital display boards to keep students informed about the latest developments in the college.

IQAC of the college conducts various workshops, conferences (National / International) andFDPs. IOACalso introducesadd-on courses from time-to-time. Mental well-being of the stakeholders in the college is ensured by the Grievance committee that looks into unfair treatment meted out while more issues of serious nature are taken care of by Internal Complaints Committee of the college having internal as well as external members. The IT committee working in synchronization with College Admin and Bursar ensures that the IT hardware (including but not limited to laboratories, library, sports, classrooms etc.) of the institution remains up to date while the Website committee ensures regular uploads of data onto the college website. In order to manage humongous data the website committee also utilizes cloud computing services. The sports committee besides helping with regular upgradation and upkeep of sports infrastructure also ensures providing regular monitoring and feedback to groom college athletes.

The Principal, teaching and non-teaching staff come together to form the collective executive body that works towards the effective implementation of the vision and mission of ANDC in a way that is centred on the students. The Staff Council has the authority to make decisions regarding practically all aspects of the executive, including but not limited to aspects of teaching and learning, curricular, co-curricular, and extracurricular activities. The principles of decentralisation and participatory management are firmly ingrained in all aspects of ANDC's academic and administrative structure, as well as its curricular, cocurricular, and extra-mural pillars. Within the context of the institution, the Timetable and Workload Committee stands out as one of the most successful examples of participatory decision making. This was demonstrated by the Committee during the COVID-19 epidemic by designing an online teaching-learning process and the use of flexible learning pedagogies. 6.3 - Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 - The institution has effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff

At ANDC, everyone is treated with the same respect due to the organization's unwavering dedication to the maxim of "giving it back to the society." In order to make this goal a reality, the organisation supports a number of different programmes, one of which is the provision of maternity, paternity, and child care leave to all employees who are eligible for it, in addition to medical benefits and access to wellness counsellors. ANDC provides its teaching and non-teaching staff with opportunities for sustained professional development to enhance their pedagogic knowledge content and hands-on skills. In addition, the establishment makes efforts to either create or invite other organisations to carry out routine capacity building and training programmes for both teaching and non-teaching staff members. 6.3.5 - Institutions Performance Appraisal System for teaching and non-teaching staff

The college has a well-regulated performance appraisal system for the staff. To this end, the staff submits Annual Performance Assessment Reports (APARs) on a yearly basis.

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Additionally, the Principal is responsible for positively reinforcing excellent work that has been done in the institution by recognising, nominating, and awarding the contribution of people and organizations at each and every public forum and occasion. For example, the college has constituted a Service Award by the name Nishtha, to felicitate college employees for completing 25 years and the principal for completing 10 years of regular service to the college. Through high-quality auditing and accounting, the college aspires to achieve the highest possible levels of accountability, transparency, and good governance. This is in accordance with the mandate outlined in the Constitution of India to give independent assurance to all parties involved. A high level of financial propriety is the primary consideration in the comprehensive guidelines that govern the financial behaviour of the officials who are responsible for incurring expenditures or sanctioning those expenditures. The auditing of the college is carried out in phases. The first audit is an internal one, and it is conducted by a Chartered Accountant who has been nominated by the college. In the second step of the process, the accounts are subjected to a Local Fund Audit (LFA), which is carried out by designated CAs who have been sent by the Government of the NCT of Delhi. The Principal Secretary (Finance) serves as the Directorate of Audit's head, and he or she is aided by the Special Secretary (Finance)

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and the Controller of Accounts (Audit). The final one is the audit by Comptroller and Auditor General of India (CAG), which confirms that financial information is presented in line with the applicable financial reporting and regulatory framework.

6.4.3 - Institutional strategies for mobilization of funds and the optimal utilization of resources

ANDC is a part of the University of Delhi and receives funding from the Government of the National Capital Territory of Delhi (GNCTD). Following a comprehensive review by the Governing Body, the draft of projected grants for the year is sent to GNCTD for approval. This draft is based on the budget that was developed by the accounts and administration departments. With the active participation of the Governing Body, Finance Committee, Library, and several related entities that aid in the preparation, division, allocation, and utilisation of money, the funds that were received as well as any other resources are used prudently. The college has established a number of fellowships and scholarships, the majority of whose funding comes from the philanthropic contributions of college employees, former college employees, and the college alumni. These fellowships/scholarships are awarded to students who have demonstrated academic excellence

as well as financial need. A portion of the fee that is paid by students is allocated to a fund called 'Student Aid for Knowledge, Success, Honour and Motivation (SAKSHAM), which provides financial support for various student organisations and activities. In order to provide high-quality education to students, adequate funding has been allotted for effective teaching and learning practices. These practices include Orientation Programmes, Workshops, Interdisciplinary Activities, Training Programmes, Faculty Development Programmes, and Refresher Courses.

The projects that the students work on are intended to have a cross-disciplinary approach. This culture of research has been fostered by the IQAC through the promotion of publication of research workand the encouragement of faculty members to write research proposals.
- Enhancing efficacy of administration and nurturing a healthy workplace: The IQAC takes the initiative to implement the best policies and procedures that it has envisioned for the college administration. The IQAC guarantees that APARs are submitted on a consistent basis by the staff. This method of self-evaluation and feedback ensures that the personal improvement records of all stakeholders are regularly updated. A fundamental step in this regard is the relaxation of 1% in the cut off given to girl candidates seeking admission in B. Sc. (H) Chemistry, Computer Science, Electronics, Physics, B. Sc. Physical Sciences with Computer Science/Electronics. The college has an Internal Complaints Committee (ICC), which comprises distinguished female lawyers, non-

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teaching employees, a capable representation of students, and is led by an experienced female faculty member. Second, the college's Sashakt society gives female students an advantage by providing them with hands-on training and inspirational presentations delivered by prominent members of the Delhi Police. The availability of a sanitary napkin dispenser and an incinerator in the women's restrooms makes for an environment that is both secure and conducive to learning for the student body. ANDC provides a specific fund for the exclusive purpose of assisting the educational pursuits of female students, empowering young people with the tools necessary to investigate the aspirations of the academic world and the transformative potential of knowledge. An exclusive Girls' Common Room is also available in the college. This room offers female students a space in which they are encouraged to revitalise their perspectives on a variety of sociopolitical issues.

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The college is actively involved in sustainable practices to reduce the impact of waste on public health and environment. It ensures segregation of solid waste and for this purpose has earmarked blue (dry waste) and green (damp waste) coloured dustbins. The college has installed industrial grade RO water systems which dispense potable water to the students and faculty. The college ensures liquid waste management by utilizing the wastewater discharged by the RO plants by collecting it separately and utilizing it for washing of tiles and mopping of corridors. Proper biomedical waste management is essential for preventing the spread of infectious diseases and protecting public health and the environment. The Biomedical Science department has in place a special container which is used collect the same and procedures are followed for its proper disposal from time to time. For Ewaste management, the college encourages responsible handling and recycling of electronic waste. The college promotes use of LED light fixtures over incandescent/conventional tubelights. It also has a dedicated container for collection of e-waste. The college does not possess any source of radioactive radiations.

ANDC promotes research at all levels - undergraduate, doctoral and postdoctoral. Besides catering to the research interests of its own students, ANDC also provides internship opportunities to undergraduate and postgraduate students from other universities. Seventeen faculty members of the College have been recognized as Ph.D. supervisor/co-supervisor by the University of Delhi.

Our faculty has published numerous research articles in various international/national journals of repute. The research projects in the college are funded by funding agencies such as DBT, DST, CSIR, MOEF, ICMR, etc.

The college has a total of 17 research laboratories, 28 laboratories for undergraduate curriculum teaching and 2 Central Instrumentation Facilities.

ANDC has initiated many schemes to encourage research culture among the faculty members. The College provides a recurring grant of Rs. 15000/- per annum to the recognized supervisors.

Additionally, a research fund has been set upwhich entailed an initial allotment of Rs. 2 crore from the College Development Grant. The interest earned from this initial allotment is used to promote research and innovation.

The College provides hands-on training for research through various workshops, seminars and conferences.

ANDC is a Nodal Center for Virtual Lab, an initiative of the Ministry of Education (MoE).

The College has received many accolades for its untiring efforts in the field of education and research. It has been listed among the top 10 Science colleges in Delhi by the India Today Survey since 2010. Moreover, the National Institutional Ranking Framework (NIRF) has consistently been listing ANDC among the top 25

Colleges.
