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#### 2.5.2 - Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

The examination committee is formed in the staff council for a term of two years. ? The College follows all the evaluation reforms of the University like the introduction of 25 as internal assessment of the students comprising of attendance (5), Assignments/Projects (10), Test/Presentation (10) in theory examinations. The rest of the marks are evaluated in the semester-end examinations. ? The students are continuously evaluated for their performance and regularity in the practical classes and are marked as internal assessments. ? The semester-end practical examinations are evaluated along with an external examiner provided by the University. ? The college provides refreshments to all the students and staff involved during practical examinations. ? The students check their internal assessment marks on ERP. Every student signs the hard copy of the internal assessment before it is mailed to the examination branch of the University. Students are free to report any discrepancy in their marks to the office/teacher concerned within a stipulated time. ? The College internal assessment committee oversees the final moderation of the internal assessment marks submitted by each department to ensure the implementation of the evaluation reforms. Faculty are involved in the centralized evaluation of the semester-end examinations conducted by the University of Delhi.

## 2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

The academic calendar prepared by the University is shared by the college at the beginning of the session and the college strictly adheres to it for all its working and non-working days. The entire departmental activities is planned to keep the academic calendar in mind. Exams including practicals are conducted as per University guidelines. The examination committee constituted in the staff council along with the support of teaching and non-teaching faculty members contribute to the smooth conduct of fair exams. Guidelines related to Internal Assessment exams are followed by students and faculty members in the best interest of students. Internal tests are spread out evenly and properly spaced so as to avoid pressuring the students with too many examinations. There is an internal assessment committee in the college that addresses the student's grievances and also looks after any discrepancies. Students are timely updated about the notices related to internal assessment, library and laboratory clearance besides facilitating the issuance of examination hall tickets etc through ERP. Each student is assigned a faculty member in the name of a mentor at the beginning of each session to discuss any of their problems. The list for such mentor-mentee is shared with the students through departmental notice boards. Notices in detail mentioning duration, basic requirement, stipend etc. for summer Projects (under ELITE flagship scheme), projects under faculty members from different streams besides those with external laboratories and/or companies are published online as well as offline.

The available financial resources are optimally utilised under the supervision of dedicated committees which are constituted with specific objectives for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities. Finance committee working in tandem with Bursar and Accounts oversees all kinds of purchases [including but not limited to laboratories (recurring as well as non-recurring), library, sports, IT etc.] in the college while following latest General Financial Rules notified by Govt. of India. The students are encouraged to participate in sports which serves to enrich and

augment their personality The sports committee ensures proper maintenance of the sports ground and sports infrastructure. Procurement of any new equipment is done by following a proper procedure and also according to the requirement of the teams. The sports committee besides helping with regular upgradation and upkeep of sports infrastructure also ensures providing regular monitoring and feedback to groom college athletes. The College faculty has been provided TABLETS to facilitate online marking of attendance uploading of internal assessment assignments, upload and access to e-content, timetable, use of Learning Management System for conducting online examination, result analysis, online leave applications, access to own leave ledger, SMS and meeting notices, online service request etc. The orientation programme 'Know Your College' has been reinforced so that the students can make best use of the facilities provided to them at the college by utilising them to best of their capacities. The programme is not only an introductory day to inform the students about the various schemes, financial aids and other facilities offered by the College, but is also followed by four days of interaction Breaking Barriers to accustom the students to the purpose and spirit of college initiatives. Students are familiarised with the academic culture, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities, skill development through research and entrepreneurship through a visual presentation. The College provides financial assistance of Rs.6000/each to all the departmental societies to organize talks by eminent Scientists for enhanced learning of students and faculty members. Non-recurring requirements for the laboratories are planned and processed well in advance for smooth implementation of the curriculum. Contingency is readily available for buying the chemicals, glassware and other such items that are required on a daily basis. It will work towards an entrepreneurship ecosystem development like engagement with mentors and technical experts, advisors, angel investors, VCs, funding agencies, peer startups, user groups (industry and or consumer), marketing etc. to facilitate establishment of start-ups. Admission of Students Admission to the College is strictly on the basis of merit of class XII marks in all the courses as prescribed by the university. ? As per the mandate of the Constitution of India to provide independent assurance to all stakeholders, the college envisions the highest standards of accountability, transparency and good governance through high-quality auditing and accounting. College audit is undertaken in sequential stages by three independent entities namely a) Internal audit, b) LFA by Govt. of NCT of Delhi and c) Comptroller Auditor General, Govt. of India. Broad guidelines governing the financial behaviour of the officers incurring or authorizing expenditure include high standards of financial propriety as the main factor. The first audit is internal and carried out by the college-appointed Chartered Accountant (CA). In the second stage, a Local Fund Audit (LFA) of the accounts is undertaken by designated CAs sent by Govt. of NCT of Delhi. The Directorate of Audit is headed by Principal Secretary (Finance) and is assisted by Spl. Secretary (Finance) and Controller of Accounts (Audit). The final one is the Financial Attest Audit carried out by CAG which ensures that financial information is presented in accordance with the applicable financial reporting and regulatory framework. The auditors are provided sufficient and appropriate audit evidence to enable them to express an opinion as to whether the financial information is free from material misstatement due to fraud or error.

The students participated in an exhibition and competition organized by Bahnishikha Women Child Welfare Society in association with National Environmental Engineering Research Institute, CSIR-NEERI 'The YUVA Awards 2018' (YUVA - Youth Understanding the Value of Air). Ban on non-biodegradable disposables in College Campus: The Eco-Club initiated the drive to stop the use of thermocol disposables in the College canteen and other kiosks inside the College premises. The use of non-biodegradable disposables have been banned even during the various events/get-togethers held in the College. The vendors are allowed to deliver food items only with biodegradable disposables.
