Beyond the Classroom ...



Acharya Narendra Deva (1889 – 1956), a veteran of India's freedom struggle, a visionary educationist and leader in social reforms was the embodiment of multifaceted greatness. He was educated in Allahabad and Banaras. After the completion of his graduation (B.A.) and post-graduation (M.A.), he achieved his L.L.B degree in 1915. But turning his back on a promising legal career and comfort, he plunged into the National Movement. He was deeply influenced by the radical nationalism of Bal Gangadhar Tilak and Aurobindo Ghosh. Acharya Narendra Deva had a rare combination of a great political acumen and true intellectual prowess. Being a scholar at heart, he continued to enrich his intellect along with his tireless struggle for the cause of India's freedom. He joined Kashi Vidyapith where he combined his academic pursuits with active politics. He was also the Vice-Chancellor of Lucknow and Banaras Hindu University.

Acharya Narendra Deva was a believer of the Marxist philosophy and he zealously worked for the preservation of human dignity and a revolutionary transformation of society on moral and humanistic grounds. He was the founder of the Congress Socialist Party and presided over the first Congress Socialist Conference at Patna in 1934, and thereafter he devoted his life to the cause of Socialism. Acharya Narendra Deva was a profound student of Buddhist philosophy and to study Buddhist literature, he learnt French, German and Pali. His books on Buddhism bear testimony to his scholarship and insight into the Buddha's way of life. Throughout his life, Narendra Deva was deeply interested in education and regarded it as the principal means for a political, social and economic revolution in the country. He believed that in the earlier stages, education should be integrated with useful activity and therefore welcomed the concept of Basic Education propounded by Mahatma Gandhi. He was an atheist and rejected the glorification of God. Acharya Ji's patriotism, political involvements, scientific outlook, nobility of spirit, deep rooted humanism, compassion and scholarship make him one of the most respected blend of versatility the country has ever seen.

Though a comparatively young college (established in 1991) Acharya Narendra Dev College has been able to carve a niche for itself and create an identity of its own. The College is recognized not only in Delhi but internationally due to the persistent efforts and diligence of the Principal, faculty and most importantly, its students. The limitations, mainly due to our location and lack of space within actually have turned into advantages. These have never dampened our spirits. They just give greater significance to our success stories.

- Since inception of the award in 2013, we have won the 'Award for Good Practices' of the University of Delhi both years running (2013 and 2014) among all colleges of the University.
- Our continuous work on 'Open Educational Resources' (OERs) was recognized far away at Berlin in 2011

– we were 'Highly Commended' in the OPAL Award for institutions' for Quality and Innovation through OERs.

- For its Advocacy work to promote 'Open Access' to educational content and its emphasis on use of proper licensing on educational materials on the web, ANDC was recognized as one of the Indian Affiliates of Creative Commons in May 2013.
- The College has a first in yet another field. We are home to an active Innovation & Entrepreneurship Development Centre (IEDC), a DST funded establishment, which promotes entrepreneurship culture among youth. ANDC-IEDC is the first in DU to establish an in-campus company – ANDY, owned and run by students.
- ANDC then went on to become the first College in DU to be awarded a Business Incubator from Ministry of Micro, Small and Medium Enterprise (MSME) – the Incubator will have funds enough to nurture the establishment of ten enterprises.

ANDC often admits students who are not among the toppers of their class, but our students when they finish are more often toppers in the University. It is the exposure and the skill set they acquire while at college that makes them identifiable. It enables them to be placed nationally and internationally with relative ease. There is, hence, no surprise that India Today group has identified us among the top 10 Science colleges in Delhi consecutively since 2009.

We assure you that your stay at ANDC will prove to be a life changing experience. We welcome you to ANDC and invite you to be part of an enthralling journey of learning, sharing, collaboration and sensitization.

RESEARCH @ ANDC

Achieving quantum leaps in academics should necessarily involve active and continuous research. The college supplements its strong and effective base of teaching traditions with research. It has developed a robust research infrastructure through nine research labs generously funded via project grants from various governmental agencies like DST, UGC, DBT, MoEF and ICMR. These laboratories provide exposure to cutting edge technologies and nurtures curiosity in the young minds such that they are able to make informed decision while considering research as a possible career later in life. The ever-growing basket of research publications by teachers and students in reputed journals bears testimony of the quality of research activities in the college. The college has conducted projects worth over INR 3.5 crores over the last few years.



The Mur pathway is an important target of Mtb and OSDD scientists regularly interact with the ANDC faculty to review the progress. The commitment of the faculty and the support of the institutional leadership to this programme have been remarkable which contributed to its success.”

Several Ph.D students registered directly with our faculty stand testimony to the quality of the teachers and their research. A student was awarded her Ph.D last year – she worked in the college lab throughout.

To promote a culture of research and motivate students to explore, the College has its self-funded ELITE (Education in Lively and Innovative Training Environment) scheme that runs through the summer break. ELITE provides students financial and infrastructural support along with mentoring, for undertaking projects. Through this scheme, the students may work not only in laboratories but could convert their society into their labs and work on real life problems. In addition, the yearlong, generously funded trans-disciplinary DU Innovation Projects have ingrained research as a necessary and active component of the academics in the college.





SPIE Student Chapter

SPIE STUDENT CHAPTER @ ANDC

The University of Delhi at ANDC SPIE (Society of Photo-Optical Instrumentation Engineers-USA) student chapter provides a unique opportunity to the students to become part of a large international organization. The SPIE chapter provides activity grants to hold workshops in area of Photonics. Under the aegis of SPIE students receive hands-on training, visit state-of-the-art laboratories and interact with subject experts and students in India and abroad. This training enables these students not only

to enhance their learning but also become mentors for schools in the conduct of science experiments.

Another 'high' for students is the provision for being awarded an Officer grant for one student to attend the International SPIE conference at San Diego, US every year. The student gets to present a research paper in front of an august audience from world-over. You can imagine what it does to the confidence levels! Over the years four students have availed this facility.



NOVEL PEDAGOGY @ ANDC



The pedagogy used at the College is an iterative development process, which progresses in incremental stages. It ensures a continuous focus on academic rigor even while adopting novel techniques that involve input from theatre, film making, debating, audio-recording, discussion, photography etc. Project-based learning is the backbone of most of our teaching especially that of the foundation courses. The various novel articulations in the teaching-learning exercise include field and industrial trips to make education at ANDC an enriching and enjoyable experience.

The IT and multi-media enabled classrooms and the laptops issued to the students encourage self-learning particularly since the operating system is 'Open Source'. Teachers use a lot of multimedia materials in class; but pedagogically speaking, what the students bring to the table and contribute in class is equally important to us! It is important to dissolve the disconnect between what we teach and what transpires

around them – students need to acquire the ability to apply the learnt concepts to solve real-life problems. We also know that success in life also depends a lot on the skills you have or acquire. We provide ample opportunities for students to explore and learn, and improve the skill-set.

The quest for knowledge at ANDC is not only sourced internally at the college, but takes them far and wide, sometimes across nations through new modes. In order to take advantage of the best available educational training and resources, web-based courses are now increasingly utilized to supplement teaching.

The college conducted video conferencing course on Genomics, Proteomics and Bioethics which that was coordinated by Ohio State University (USA), Houston University (USA), Anna University, Chennai and Garvare College, Pune.

In order to facilitate the adoption of Open Source software in education, the new entrants to the college were provided training through a 8-day video conferencing workshop coordinated by Institute of Informatics and Communication, South Campus, DU.







Entrepreneurship

ENTREPRENEURSHIP OPPORTUNITIES @ ANDC

The present day society and modern work environments puts a lot of premium to interpersonal and communications skills. The college provides practical and innovative training to help students overcome their inhibitions and enable them to take advantage of emerging opportunities.

The Innovation & Entrepreneurship Development Centre (IEDC) established under the auspices of National Science and Technology Entrepreneurship Development Board (NSTEDB), Department of Science & Technology provides training, support and the wherewithal to take up entrepreneurship in a proactive and sustained manner. The Centre provides training through Entrepreneurship



Awareness Camps (EAC), Entrepreneurship Development Programs (EDP) and funding for Students' Innovation Projects.

A unique facility – the Entrepreneurship Lab is a nerve Centre for experimenting with entrepreneurs ideas and concepts. This initiative has already matured in the form of ANDY- an in-campus company that reflects the spirit and energy of ANDC's youth.

In recognition of these efforts, the Ministry of Micro, Small and Medium Enterprise (MSME) has provided a grant of Business Incubator (BI) to support commercialization of innovative ideas. ANDC is the exclusive recipient of this grant among the colleges of DU.

While the entrepreneurship initiatives are encouraging students to become job-creators, there is no dearth of opportunities in the very active Placements Cell of the college. Our Placement Officer was recently recognized for his stellar work by Wipro.

OPENING UP OF EDUCATION @ ANDC

The Open paradigm is a central feature in the life at ANDC. It refers to institutional practices and programmatic initiatives that broaden access to learning and training than traditionally available in a university system. Adoption of FOSS (Free and Open Source Software) in teaching & administration, creation and dissemination of



OERs (Open Educational Resources) which are acclaimed practices world-wide have found resonance here and continues to benefit its primary stakeholders - the content-creators, the faculty and the students, besides, of course, anyone with internet access.

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
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EXPERIENCE AND LEARN @ANDC

The teaching-learning process is extremely dynamic and continuously evolving. To facilitate enhancement of knowledge base and adoption of modern development in all fields of academic endeavor, the college emphasizes on constant up-gradation of skills-sets. This is achieved through organization of various workshops, conferences, seminars, webinars, symposia etc. These cover various academic as well as pedagogic issues. Shared knowledge and collaborative learning can contribute much more than top-down lectures. Recognizing this, besides workshops by teachers for students, these have also been conducted by teachers for other teachers, students for other students and by students



for teachers! The college website would not be what it is if it were not for some excellent training by students.

We often call in experts when we identify an area that we want to explore. Such spaces provide an opportunity to the college community to interact with experts from diverse fields. In addition, it provides space for some novel hands-on learning not only for students but also for faculty and non-teaching staff. When the aim is to learn it does not matter who teaches. This paradigm was again reiterated recently through a three-day workshop on basic computer use, to train all non-teaching staff, by students.

Theatre in Education @ ANDC



Our belief that theatre can be great equalizer and can make dramatic changes in an individual makes us conduct the ECPDT (Effective Communication and Personality Development through Theatre) course every year. The course is inspired by the vision of life-skills-based education of UNICEF and WHO. It encompasses dedicated training by mentors associated with National School of Drama. It seeks to empower students with self-belief, decision-making capabilities, ability for critical analysis and to think and express independently with confidence.



Dhwani - the theatre society is in sync with showcasing artistic talent and creative skills. Besides routine skits, street plays etc., it provides a platform for students to exhibit their acquired skill-set in the form of a mega annual theatre production each year. We have gained repute for putting up most professional of productions among the theatre circles.





EMPOWERMENT @ ANDC

Only acceptance and respect for diversity can foster a healthy environment in society. We understand that each individual is unique, and recognize that we have diverse abilities. We also believe, somewhere, in the theory of multiple intelligences. Besides, diversity along the dimensions of gender, socio-economic status, physical abilities, religious beliefs, political beliefs, or other ideologies also marks our society. We believe in providing a milieu for exploration and understanding of these differences in a safe, positive, and nurturing environment, leading to a support and protection of the rich diversity, and by valuing individuals and groups, free from prejudice.

The Equal Opportunity Cell (EOC) of the college strives hard to ensure equity and equal opportunities for persons with disabilities (PwD) to ensure assimilation into the mainstream. The efforts of EOC have sensitized the entire college community towards people with the special abilities and needs. This has also resulted in inspiring a number of differently-abled students to come forward for para-sports – a field that our sports faculty member specializes in.

Sashakt is the college society geared towards empowering the girl-students through discussions, seminars and other

activities. It needs a concerted effort to encourage the girl-students to grow up to be independent, confident women, capable of taking their own decisions and speaking out against society-driven atrocities. That there is a greater need to educate the 'male' in society has to be recognized if we are to attempt to sensitize and eliminate deep-rooted social malice towards women.



Erstwhile known as Students Aid Fund, SAKSHAM (Student Aid for Knowledge, Success, Honour and Motivation) scheme ensures financial aid (often not only free-ships, but also monthly stipends and book-banks) for needy students for the entire duration of their study in the college. SAKSHAM has led to several success stories in the college!

Funded solely by the college, EXPLORE (Excursions for Peer Learning in an Open and Rejuvenating Environment), allows students to undertake short trips, educational tours or field trips accompanied by their classmates and faculty. These trips not only rejuvenate the students for renewed focus on studies but also provide them unique experiences which hitherto were not available to many students.

The annual fest 'Accenture' is an event to showcase the diverse talent of students and hone and polish their latent skills. INFRASTRUCTURE @ ANDC

The College has an ever-increasing built-up area, with well-equipped laboratories and an enviable library. We have amongst the best (if not the very best) laboratories for teaching and research amongst the colleges of the University. The College has excellent campus-wide Wi-Fi that is available 24 Hours at the speed of 100 Mbps.

This year besides four new classrooms, we add a new Seminar Hall, a new Block for Zoology Department with huge labs, and new computer laboratories for the FYUP courses. 



Reaching out @ ANDC

3% seats of total intake are available (supernumerary) for PwD as per University of Delhi rules.

The College offers DC-II in all courses where we are offering DC-I course. In addition, we also offer DC-II course of Bachelors with Honours in Management Studies.

Admission to M.Sc. courses is done through a centralized procedure by the University of Delhi.

Admission Guidelines

- All the candidates interested in seeking admission in undergraduate courses in Delhi University are required to fill the pre-admission form either online or offline for all categories. **There will be no pre-admission form at the college level.**
- Admission to the four year Undergraduate degree course shall be based on Discipline-I (Major Discipline).
- Admission for all categories – General, OBC, SC, ST and PwD – will be carried out by the College and the cut-offs for all categories will be announced simultaneously.
- Admission to the General category seats will be strictly in the order of merit including SC/ST/OBC/PwD candidates.

Admission Procedure

- Fill online/offline form.
- The University will notify the cut-off marks through print and electronic media as per schedule. The cut-offs will also be displayed on the University website (<http://du.ac.in>), the College website (<http://andcollege.du.ac.in/>) and the College notice board.
- The College will admit all students who have marks that meet the announced cut-off criteria, as per schedule. **There is no first-come-first serve policy.**
- After the declaration of the cut-off lists by the University, the student will need to report to the College for admission within the scheduled dates with complete documents.
- At this stage, the student would be required to fill the College admission

form and the University enrolment form.

- **At the time of admission the students must be accompanied by their parent/guardian.**
- Along with the application form, students will have to submit the original certificates and a set of self-attested copies of each of the following:
 - a. Original Certificate of last qualifying examination (Class XII) issued by the Board or the University and Provisional School/College leaving Certificate in case original has not been issued.
 - b. Marks sheet of the last qualifying examination (Class XII) passed.
 - c. Class X Marks sheet.
 - d. Class X Board Examination Certificate.
 - e. Character Certificate (recent) of School/College last attended.
 - f. Documentary evidence of having studied Hindi till class VIII, if the student has not studied Hindi in Class X. Those students who do not have Hindi pass certificate should give a written undertaking that they will clear the required paper in Hindi in order to receive the graduation degree.
 - g. Two recent passport size self-attested photographs.
 - h. SC/ST Certificate (**in the name of the candidate**), issued by the competent authority – for SC/ST candidates.
 - i. OBC (Non-Creamy Layer) Certificate (**in the name of the candidate**) – for OBC

candidates. The certificate should have been issued by the competent authority in/after December 2013.

- j. Transfer certificate from school /college as well as migration certificate from Board/ University are required from those students who have passed Senior Secondary School from outside Delhi.

- Admission shall be subject to verification of the certificates. The College retains the right to seek authentication from the concerned authorities issuing the certificates.

- In case a student cancels his/ her admission in the College in order to move to another College on

declaration of subsequent cut off lists or needs certificates for institutions outside Delhi University, the College will promptly return the documents to the student, on providing proper documentary evidence.

- No student will be allowed to take admission in two courses/ colleges simultaneously. In case, they are found to have done so, both admissions shall be cancelled.

- For admission under the Sports and ECA (Extra-Curricular Activities) categories, the students need to fill Sports/ ECA application forms, available in the College. The admission to these categories shall be on the basis of guidelines issued by the University.

Please note that if any false attestation / falsified records are detected, the students will be debarred from any course in the University or its college(s) for the next five years and in addition, a criminal case under relevant sections of IPC (viz. 470, 471, 474 IPC etc.) will be instituted against him/her.

In case the student is already enrolled in the University of Delhi, the University Enrolment Number should be mentioned in the college's admission form.

Eligibility Criteria

There is no minimum age bar for admission to Under-Graduate courses and Post-Graduate courses in the University and its colleges. Selection in various courses offered by the College will be done on the basis of marks

secured in the class XII Examination of the CBSE or an equivalent Board. The applicant should take into account both theory and practical (where relevant) marks while submitting their aggregate percentage.

Subjects to be included for basis of selection (PCM, PCB/Bt) must have at least 70% component of theory (theory does not include internal assessment/ continuous evaluation etc.) in the qualifying exam otherwise a disadvantage of 10% of maximum marks shall be levied on each subject.

For Calculation of Best of four percentage:

- i. If a candidate has not studied the subject in which he/she is seeking admission in the Discipline I, then a disadvantage of 2% shall be imposed on the calculated Best of Four percentage.
- ii. The Colleges will consider only the academic/elective subject for calculation of Best of Four percentage if the candidate has studied at least four academic/elective subjects or one language and three academic/elective subjects.
- iii. In case a candidate has not studied three academic/elective subjects, then a disadvantage of 10% of the maximum marks may be levied on each such non-elective subject(s) to be included for the calculation of Best of Four percentage.
- iv. In case a candidate has studied three academic/elective subjects but wishes to include the percentage of non-elective subjects for the calculation of Best of Four, then a disadvantage of 10% of the maximum marks may be levied on each such non-elective subject(s) to be included for the calculation of Best of Four percentage.
- v. All the academic subjects should have 70% component of theory exams (theory exam does not include internal assessment/ continuous evaluation etc.). Otherwise these will be considered as non-elective subject.
- vi. In case a candidate has studied both

elective and core in any language, then core language will be treated as language, while elective language can be considered as academic/elective subject.

Minimum Eligibility Conditions

These are set by the University for admission to the respective courses.

A. General Category

Bachelors with Honours in Biomedical Science

55 % aggregate in Physics, Chemistry and Biology/ Biotechnology (PCB/Bt) subjects in the Senior Secondary Exam (12th class).

At least 50% marks in English (compulsory)

Students having PCB/Bt with Mathematics (at least 60% marks) will be given an advantage of 3% over and above their PCB/Bt aggregate.

Bachelors with Honours in Botany and Zoology

An aggregate of at least 55% marks in Physics, Chemistry and Biology/ Biotechnology (PCB/Bt).

At least 50% marks in English (compulsory subject).

Bachelors with Honours in Chemistry and Physics

An aggregate of at least 55% marks in Physics, Chemistry and Mathematics (PCM).

At least 50% marks in English (compulsory subject).

For calculation of 'Best of Four' subjects percentage:

- A. One Language (Core/Elective/Functional)
- B. Subject in which admission is sought (Discipline I)
- C. Any two other academic/elective subjects

Bachelors with Honours in Mathematics

At least 50% marks in Mathematics (compulsory subject).

At least 45% marks in the qualifying examination.

Merit shall be determined on the basis of one Language, Mathematics under academic stream and two best elective subjects.

Bachelors with Honours in Commerce

- An aggregate of at least 45% marks in the qualifying examination. The merit shall be determined on the basis of one language and three best electives (1L + 3E).
- 2% is reduced from the aggregate obtained by students of Science and Humanities streams.

1L + 3E indicate the aggregate of one language and three Electives from among the list of Academic/Elective subjects offered by Delhi University.

Accountancy will be treated as equivalent to Commerce wherever any board is not offering commerce as a subject.

B. Tech. Electronics

An aggregate of at least 55% marks in Physics, Chemistry and Mathematics (PCM).

At least 50% marks in English (compulsory subject).

B. Tech. Computer Science

An aggregate of at least 55 % marks in four subjects including Mathematics, one language and two other subjects listed as academic subjects.

Should have scored 60% or more marks in Mathematics.

Students who have studied Physics and Chemistry/Computer Science will be given 5% additional weightage.

B. Admission of Other Backward Classes (OBC) students

Twenty seven per cent seats in each course will be reserved for the OBC candidates who belong to the 'Non-Creamy Layer' and whose castes appear in the Central List (www.ncbc.nic.in). The non-creamy layer is identified by the **Gross Annual Income below INR 6 lakhs**. Students have to produce an original OBC certificate in their own name that states they are not from the creamy layer (socially advantaged persons). The certificate should have been **issued in/ after December 2013**.

The OBC candidates shall be given a relaxation in the minimum eligibility in the qualifying examination to the extent of 10% of the minimum eligibility marks prescribed for the General category candidates. For example, if the minimum eligibility for admission to course is 50% for the General category candidates, the minimum eligibility for the OBC would be 45% (i.e. 10% less of 50%).

All those OBC candidates who meet the minimum eligibility marks in the qualifying examination shall be eligible for admission in the order of their merit, keeping in view the availability of seats reserved for them.

The seats reserved for the OBCs shall be filled with the OBC candidates only. Only if OBC candidates possessing the minimum eligibility marks are not available in the OBC category on the last date of admission date then the vacant OBC seats shall be filled up by other eligible candidate.

C. Scheduled Caste / Tribe candidates

As per University rules 15 % seats are reserved for Scheduled Castes and 7 ½ % for Scheduled Tribes Students (interchangeable, if necessary). The college shall announce separate cut off marks for these categories.

Relaxation in the minimum eligibility in the qualifying examination to the extent of 5% shall be given to SC/ST candidates. In case, after giving 5% relaxation, the reserved seats still remain vacant, further relaxation shall be given to the extent required in order to fill up all the reserved seats.

SC/ST/OBC students who get admission under open merit will not be included in the reserved quota meant for them.

D. Persons with Disabilities (PwD)

3% seats are reserved for Persons with Disabilities (PwD) candidates. The PwD candidates with not less than 40% disability shall be given a relaxation in the minimum eligibility in the qualifying examination to the extent of 5%. The cut-off lists will be put-up by colleges.

E. Admission on the Basis of Sports and Extracurricular Distinctions

1. As per University rules, up to 5% of the total number of seats will be offered for admission on the basis of sports and co-curricular distinctions for admission to the 1st year of any course.
2. Candidates seeking admission on the basis of extracurricular activities (ECA) are required to fill the Sports/ECA application form, giving details of the activities at the school level on a plain paper along with photocopies of relevant certificates and testimonials. These forms will be available in the College from 2nd June, 2014. Last date of submission of forms is 16th June, 2014.
3. Candidates seeking admission under sports/ECA category must submit any participation/winning certificate, as

4. Candidates desirous of gaining admission to the undergraduate courses in the College on the basis of sports quota have to satisfy conditions and rules laid down by University of Delhi.
5. The candidates who have participated in International level will be given direct admission.
6. The list of the candidates short-listed for trials for Sports/ECA along with the dates will be displayed on the College notice board and website on 30th June, 2014. Trials for the same will be held on 10th July, 2014. Selected candidates will have to take admission and pay fees within three days.
7. Candidates who get admitted under Sports/ ECA category have to sign an undertaking/ affidavit that they will represent the college when asked to do so throughout their stay in the college.

F. Gap year students

Students who have had a gap in their education must bring in original admission slips, admit cards etc. for any examination taken or certificates of courses attended in the gap period to be able to gain admission to the undergraduate course for which they qualify.

G. Other Special Categories

Admission for the undermentioned categories is centralized. The concerned students should have got themselves

registered in the University. The University allots the colleges to the applicants and forwards the list. The college admits students as per the list. For further details please refer University website (www.du.ac.in).

- (i) **Children /Widows of the Officers and Men of the Armed Forces including Para-Military Personnel, Killed/Disabled in action or on duty, Gallantry Awardees.**
- (ii) **Wards of Kashmiri Migrants**
- (iii) **Foreign Students**

Basis of Selection

Selection would be on the basis of marks secured in the Senior Secondary School Examination of the CBSE or an equivalent Board. The College will declare cut offs

Cancellation and Withdrawal of Admission

Cancellation of admission and refund of fee (for UG courses) would be as per the following rules:

GENERAL RULES @ ANDC

Abbreviated extracts from the University of Delhi Ordinances are mentioned below. For details of the Ordinances XV - B, XV - C and XV - D of the University of

Delhi, the candidate is advised to consult the University of Delhi website (<http://www.du.ac.in>) or the University of Delhi calendar.

ACTS OF GROSS INDISCIPLINE

Ordinances XV – B: Maintenance of discipline

Students of the College are expected to behave responsibly both inside and outside the College. Ragging in any form anywhere is strictly prohibited and is punishable under Ordinance XV - B and XV - C of the University, besides an FIR being lodged against them. Disciplinary action would be taken against:

- Any practice — whether verbal or otherwise-derogatory to women;
- Causing disruption in any manner in the academic functioning of the University system;
- Wilful destruction of institutional property;
- Creating ill-will or intolerance on religious or communal grounds;
- Violation of status, dignity and honour of students belonging to scheduled castes and tribes, other backward classes or any community;
- Any attempt at bribing or corruption in any manner;
- Physical assault or threat to use physical force against any member of the College fraternity;
- Carrying of, use of or threat to use of any weapon;
- Any violation of the provisions of the Civil Rights Protection Act, 1976.

- Any violation of Ordinance XV- D against Sexual Harassment.
- Any violation of Ordinance XV-C against Ragging.

Besides, strict action will be invited for acts such as:

- Boisterous behaviour in the College premises.
- Smoking and consumption of alcohol in the College premises or being found in an inebriated state.
- Use of mobile phones in classrooms, laboratories, library and any other restricted area.

Prohibition of and Punishment for Ragging

We believe that academic institutions are places of enlightenment and enjoyment. While we appreciate interaction among students, our College is absolutely intolerant towards ragging. Any incident that is reported is severely dealt with by the Proctorial Committee of the College in accordance with the rules of the University of Delhi mentioned in Ordinance XV-C.

ORDINANCE XV-C (abridged)

Ragging in any form is strictly prohibited within the premises of the College, at any place in Delhi University system as well as on public transport. Ragging involves

acts by which dominant power or status of senior students is brought to bear on students freshly enrolled or on students considered junior or inferior by other students and includes individual/collective acts or practices which: (a) involve physical assault or threat or use of physical force, (b) violate the status, dignity and honour of students, (c) violate the status, dignity and honour of students belonging to the

SC & ST, (d) expose students to ridicule and contempt and affect their self-esteem and (e) entail verbal abuse and aggression, indecent gestures and obscene behavior. The Principal shall take immediate action on any information regarding the occurrence of ragging. The punishment ranges from rustication, expulsion, cancellation of examination to withdrawal of degree awarded.

IDENTITY CARD

Identity card detailing name, address and phone number is issued to each student immediately after admission. It is mandatory to carry the identity card to College every day since entry to the College as well as the library is based on it. Failure to produce the identity card is liable to attract disciplinary action. Loss of identity card has to be reported to the College

along with a copy of FIR (First Information Report) lodged with the police. Identity card remains the College property and has to be produced/ submitted on demand by any of the College staff or the security staff. A duplicate identity card shall then be issued on payment of INR 150/- on first instance and INR 500/- on subsequent instances, which includes Identity Card fee and fine.

USE OF MOBILE PHONE

Students are advised to use their mobile phones responsibly. Mobile phones should be kept on the silent mode within College premises. Use of cell phone is strictly prohibited inside the classroom, laboratory, library, Administrative and Accounts Block and near the Principal's office. Listening to music or playing songs on loud speaker-

mode of cell phones is strictly banned within the College premises.

Defaulters are liable for punishment which may be a fine up-to-the cost of the cellphone and/or reformatory task and/or confiscation of cellphone. Repeated offence will be treated as a gross in-disciplinary act.

NOTICE BOARDS

Notice boards of the College display important information regarding schedule of classes, examinations, attendance, holidays, activities, fellowships, scholarships etc. It is imperative that students read

the Notice Boards regularly to keep themselves updated about various events in the College. Ignorance of any notice will not be accepted as a plea or excuse for noncompliance or delay in any matter.
